MEMORANDUM FOR Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1

SUBJECT: Delegation of Authority for the Army's Department of Defense Executive Agent Responsibilities, Functions and Authorities for the United States Military Entrance Processing Command


1. References:

- a. Department of Defense (DoD) Directive 5101.1, Subject: DoD Executive Agent, September 3, 2002.
- b. Department of Defense Directive 1145.02E, Subject: United States Military Entrance Processing Command (USMEPCOM), January 8, 2005.

2. Pursuant to reference 1a, paragraph 4.3, I hereby designate the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1, as the Responsible Official for my Executive Agent responsibilities and delegate to the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1, the authority to act on my behalf for any and all responsibilities, functions, and authorities for the USMEPCOM as detailed in reference 1b.

3. Unless expressly prohibited or restricted by law, directive, regulation or policy, you may redelegate this authority within your organization to a general officer or member of the Senior Executive Service. If you elect to redelegate this authority, you may further restrict or condition your delegate's exercise of the same. A re delegation of authority shall not be effective unless it is in writing, with the official designated by organizational title, is signed by you and has been determined to be not legally objectionable by the Office of the Army General Counsel. A copy of the delegation must be maintained in the office where the authority is held. No re delegation shall take effect until a record copy of the same has been provided to the Administrative Assistant to the Secretary of the Army, who is my focal point for DoD Executive Agent matters, for archiving. You will remain cognizant of and accountable for all actions taken pursuant to the delegated or redelegated authorities.

4. This delegation is effective immediately and expires two years from the date of this memorandum, unless earlier canceled, modified or withdrawn.
