




Department of the Army Pace Award

Named after former Secretary of the Army The Honorable Frank Pace, Jr., the Pace Award has been presented annually since 1962 to one Army officer, lieutenant colonel or below, and one civilian employee, GS-14 equivalent or below, assigned in a staff capacity to Headquarters, Department of the Army, for a contribution of outstanding significance to the Army that culminated during the calendar year. Awardees are selected based on their performance and completion of significant staff assignments that benefit the Army by providing substantial financial savings, or technological or military development.

The Honorable Frank Pace, Jr.

was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, on 5 July 1912; attended local schools and then the Hill School, Pottstown, Pennsylvania; graduated from Princeton University, 1933; received a degree from Harvard University, 1936; was admitted to the Arkansas bar and practiced law there, 1936–1942; was assistant district attorney of the Twelfth Judicial District, 1936–1938; was general attorney, Arkansas Revenue Department, 1938–1940; married Margaret Janney, 1940; entered the Army as a second lieutenant, 1942; served in the Air Transport Command, Army Air Corps, and emerged as a major, 1945; was a special assistant to the Attorney General, U.S. Taxation Division, 1946; was executive assistant to the Postmaster General, 1946–1948; was assistant director, 1948, then director, 1949–1950, of the Bureau of the Budget; served as Secretary of the Army, 12 April 1950–20 January 1953; executed the structural and functional changes mandated by the Army Organization Act of 1950 and headed the Army during the Korean War, 1950–1953; implemented policies to broaden the Army's use of Black manpower; elevated research and development to the Deputy Chief of Staff level; was chairman of the Defense Ministers Conference, North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), 1950; was chairman of the American Council of NATO, 1957–1960; was vice chairman, President's Commission on National Goals, 1959–1960; was a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, 1961–1973; was chairman of the board, Corporation for Public Broadcasting, 1968–1972; was a member and past president of the National Institute of Social Sciences and a member of the Brookings Institution; died in Greenwich, Connecticut, on 8 January 1988.

U.S. Army Audit Agency

For her significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2011 as an Auditor, Human Capital Audits Division, U.S. Army Audit Agency. Ms. Fultz was instrumental in improving Reserve Force readiness while helping the Army strengthen its financial management of scarce resources. Her comprehensive analyses and clear-cut findings regarding the retention of long-term nonparticipants—U.S. Army Reserve personnel who missed at least nine drill training assemblies—identified the unnecessary costs associated with their retention and how their inability to support contingency operations negatively affects the Force. More significantly, her research, detailed summaries, and subject matter expertise helped the Army avoid more than \$150 million in unnecessary life insurance and health care premiums for these personnel. Ms. Fultz's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of government service and are a great credit to her, Army Audit Agency, and the Department of the Army.

Office of the Chief Information Officer/G-6

For his significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2011 as a Staff Officer; Army Data Center Consolidation Division; Architecture, Operations, Networks and Space Directorate; Chief Information Officer/G-6. Lieutenant Colonel Gribshaw established the Army Data Center Consolidation Plan in response to a federally mandated initiative. Through his discipline, work ethic, innovative thinking, and detailed planning, he generated a true inventory of the Army's existing data center assets and created a common operating picture now used across the Army Staff. Using this information, he staffed a strategic Data Center Consolidation Plan through the Office of the Secretary of Defense to the Office of Management and Budget, and provided the Secretary of the Army with the only on-time response to Department of Defense inquiries on the status of consolidation efforts. His outstanding performance was instrumental in setting the stage for the Army's successful efforts to address today's resource constraints while sustaining essential, high-quality information technology services to Soldiers and civilians worldwide. Lieutenant Colonel Gribshaw's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and are a great credit to him, the Chief Information Officer/G-6, and the Department of the Army.



The Honorable Joseph W. Westphal

Under Secretary of the Army



Dr. Joseph W. Westphal currently serves as the 30th Under Secretary of the Army. He has had a distinguished career of service in both academia and government.

Dr. Westphal served as Chancellor of the University of Maine System and Professor of Political Science at the University of Maine. He also served as the Provost, Senior Vice President for Research, and Professor of Environmental Studies at The New School in New York City. He stepped down from this position to serve as a member of President Obama's Transition Team for Defense matters in December 2008.

Dr. Westphal spent his first 12 years in academia as a faculty member of Oklahoma State University, where he worked as a professor of political science, later becoming head of the department. During his many years of public service, Dr. Westphal has lectured at numerous universities around the world and taught public policy as an Adjunct Professor at Georgetown University while working in Washington, DC.

In addition to a distinguished academic career, Dr. Westphal has had a prestigious and varied career in public service. During 2001, he served as the Acting Secretary of the Army, and from 1998 to 2001, he served as the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Civil Works).

Dr. Westphal has extensive experience working in the U.S. Congress and other departments within the executive branch. He served as the Senior Policy Advisor for Water Resources at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency during the Clinton Administration. He also worked in Congress in various capacities, including directing a bipartisan congressional caucus in the House and Senate, serving as a budget analyst and assistant to the Chairman of the U.S. House Committee on the Budget, and working on Members' staffs. Earlier in his public service career, Dr. Westphal worked as a policy advisor to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior.

Dr. Westphal received his bachelor's degree from Adelphi University, his master's degree from Oklahoma State University, and his Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He is married and has four children and six grandchildren.
