

Remarks and Presentation of Pace Awards

The Army Song

The Honorable Frank Pace, Jr.



was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, on 5 July 1912; attended local schools and then the Hill School, Pottstown, Pennsylvania; graduated from Princeton University, 1933; received a degree from Harvard University, 1936; was admitted to the Arkansas bar and practiced law there, 1936–1942; was assistant district attorney of the Twelfth Judicial District, 1936–1938; was general attorney, Arkansas Revenue Department, 1938–1940; married Margaret Janney, 1940; entered the Army as a second lieutenant, 1942; served in the Air Transport Command, Army Air Corps, and emerged as a major, 1945; was a special assistant to the Attorney General, U.S. Taxation Division, 1946; was executive assistant to the Postmaster General, 1946–1948; was assistant director, 1948, then director, 1949–1950, of the Bureau of the Budget; served as Secretary of the Army, 12 April 1950–20 January 1953; executed the structural and functional changes mandated by the Army Organization Act of 1950 and headed the Army during the Korean War, 1950–1953; implemented policies to broaden the Army's use of Black manpower; elevated research and development to the Deputy Chief of Staff level; was chairman of the Defense Ministers Conference, North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), 1950; was chairman of the American Council of NATO, 1957–1960; was vice chairman, President's Commission on National Goals, 1959–1960; was a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, 1961–1973; was chairman of the board, Corporation for Public Broadcasting, 1968–1972; was a member and past president of the National Institute of Social Sciences and a member of the Brookings Institution; died in Greenwich, Connecticut, on 8 January 1988.



Department of the Army Pace Award

Named after former Secretary of the Army The Honorable Frank Pace, Jr., the Pace Award has been presented annually since 1962 to one Army officer, lieutenant colonel or below, and one civilian employee, GS-14 equivalent or below, assigned in a staff capacity to Headquarters, Department of the Army, for a contribution of outstanding significance to the Army that culminated during the calendar year. Awardees are selected based on their performance and completion of significant staff assignments that benefit the Army by providing substantial financial savings, or technological or military development.

MR. DEAN A. FRISOLI

for his significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2012 as a Logistics Management Specialist, Major End Items Division in the Army's Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4. Mr. Frisoli's expertise in systems and catalogue processes enabled him to design and implement a database system that paved the way for a highly functional interface between enterprises. His initiative and willingness to take on a significantly increased workload to identify the system's capabilities and potential and then establish business rules for evaluating and processing over 164,000 nonstandard catalog records with a property book value of \$53 billion contributed significantly to the successful deployment of this critical enabler. Mr. Frisoli's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of Government service and are a great credit to him, the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4 and the Department of the Army.

for his significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2012 as an Active Component Manpower Analyst, Program Analysis and Evaluation Directorate, in the Army's Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-8. Lieutenant Colonel Kolb's thorough understanding of the complexities of military compensation, coupled with his ability to produce strategic talking points for the Army's senior leaders, aided in productive engagements with the Office of the Secretary of Defense and Congress during this time of uncertainty and fiscal constraint. In spite of many studies that produced inconsistent results, his objective analyses enabled the Army's senior leaders to better understand how military compensation truly affects the Army's budget. Lieutenant Colonel Kolb's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and are a great credit to him, the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-8 and the Department of the Army.

Mr. Thomas R. Lamont, Assistant Secretary of the Army (Manpower & Reserve Affairs), is responsible for the supervision of the manpower, personnel and reserve component affairs for the Department of Army. In this position, he serves as the Army's point person for policy and performance oversight of human resources (military, civilian and contractor) training, readiness, mobilization, military health affairs, force structure, manpower management, equal opportunity, equal employment opportunity and other critical matters as part of the Army leadership.

On April 27, 2009, President Barack H. Obama nominated Thomas R. Lamont as Assistant Secretary of the Army (Manpower & Reserve Affairs) and he was confirmed by the U.S. Senate on May 18, 2009. Prior to his appointment, he was the Chair of University of Illinois Board of Trustees and a longtime Springfield, Illinois attorney and resident partner for the Chicago firms of Gordon & Glickson and Altheimer & Gray, and the historic Springfield firm of Brown, Hay & Stephens, whose members previously included Abraham Lincoln. He concentrated his practice in Government Law and Legislative Affairs.

In the public arena, Mr. Lamont served as Assistant Illinois Attorney General, Executive Director of the Illinois Board of Higher Education, and Special Counsel and Adjunct Professor of Law to the University of Illinois. In the mid 1970's, he served as a Counsel to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives.

In 1990, Mr. Lamont was elected to the University of Illinois Board of Trustees. In addition, he served as a trustee of the State University Retirement System, a member of the Illinois Board of Higher Education, and on U.S. Senator Alan J. Dixon's Military Academy Appointments Committee.

He is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces, U.S. District Courts and Illinois State Courts.

Mr. Lamont served as a Judge Advocate General in the Illinois Army National Guard for over 25 years. He culminated his career serving as the Illinois Staff Judge Advocate and retired as a Colonel in 2007. His military awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit and the Meritorious Service Medal.

Mr. Lamont received his bachelor's degree from Illinois State University in 1969 and earned his law degree from the University of Illinois, College of Law in 1972.
